Living in the Wilderness

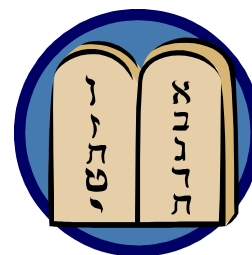
The late Reform Rabbi, Stephen Wise, was once seated at a banquet next to a woman who tried to impress him with her lineage. "One of my ancestors," she said proudly, "witnessed the signing of the Declaration of Independence." The Rabbi could not resist saying: "My ancestors were present at the giving of the Ten Commandments." This story as told by Rabbi Greenberg reminds us of the tremendous importance of the holiday of Shavuot. This holiday which occurs in spring carries an important message for us today. The commandments and some say the entire Torah was given to our people not in a royal temple or glorious city, but in the harsh, hot desert. It was in the wilderness that we became a people and discovered who we were and what direction our lives would take.

In today's world, many may find themselves again in the wilderness. During these challenging economic times, some may find themselves without a job or their retirement savings depleted. Some may have suffered a loss of a family member who was dear and integral to their lives. Others may have anxiety over family situations or feel the pain of loneliness. This is where the message of Shavuot is so important. God does not abandon us during the times we are in the wilderness. God gave us our ethical and moral compass in the darkness of the wilderness. In our own personal times of darkness, we can reach out to God knowing that his light will show a pathway out of the wilderness.

During trying times, it is important to not just think of ourselves but to reach out to others. If you are fortunate at this time in your life, this is a time to help those in the wilderness and be a partner with God in helping others find God's pathway of light. For those in need, it is still important to think beyond personal needs. By volunteering, you not only help others, you feel good

about reaching out to those in need, and through these people new connections and paths may open.

As we celebrate Shavuot, let us again be reminded where the Ten Commandments were given. Let us remember that God's light shines even in the darkest times of our lives.



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Our Building Requires Your Money, But Our Faith Needs Something More

In the January newsletter, I asked each of you to consider making an ongoing monetary investment in the physical future of our synagogue. As our 60th Anniversary Celebration approaches, our capital improvements are meant to ensure that our grandchildren — 60 years in the future from us — will continue to have a structurally sound, aesthetically beautiful and easily accessible building to preserve their own dedication to our shared faith.

At the risk of repeating myself, I'd like to use this edition to pursue a similar theme of "contribution." I am making a personal appeal to all of you in the B'nai Israel family to look ahead to our 2009-10 calendar year and begin considering *now* how you can give something else (something far more personal) to our shared faith in Judaism.

For lack of a grabbier catchphrase, let's call my proposal, "The .002 Plan."

Simply put, the average 30-day month consists of 43,200 minutes. Your attendance to just one of our monthly services would require about 90 of those minutes (Note that I didn't say "both" services. I don't want to be accused of being greedy here). By my rudimentary math, this level of spiritual commitment would amount to .002 percent — that's two one-thousandths — of your total monthly time.

Anyone who has attended one of Religious Director Gary Wolfman's services will attest to the fact that they are a spiritually enlightening and gratifying in ways that are not often anticipated. With the able assistance of Associate Religious Director Lowell Louis, our congregation is assured that we will host services on a consistent twice (or more)-monthly basis. Not to put to fine a point on it, please note that while our congregation may "host" a service, that doesn't mean we will "attend" the service. Fact is, we've had far too few minyans on far too many occasions this year.

Trust me, I'm not waving a finger at anybody here. Until I took on the role of president, I would have described my own religious attendance as "spotty at best." I'm guilty as charged. I live in my own glass house and am not inclined to throw stones at anybody else's.



But as I've tried to increase my personal attendance at our services, I discovered something along the way: What began out of a sense of obligation has evolved into something more profound. I may have found a way to carve out that .002 percent of my time, but I've ended up feeling like I'm about a 30 percent better human being in the process (As they say in the infomercials, "Results may vary on an individual basis."). Maybe there's some genuine truth to the classic notion that prayer is good for the soul? All I'm asking is that you give it a try: You may surprise yourself.

(And if you don't consider yourself a *religious* individual, there's nothing quite as inspiring — maybe cathartic is a better word? — about finding yourself singing in public. That's also worth giving the ol' college try, even if on a trial basis.)

Gary — working alongside the B'nai Israel Ritual Committee and pending approval by the Board of Trustees — has envisioned a 2009-10 services schedule that, hopefully, is responsive to many of the suggestions we heard this year aimed at upping attendance at our services (i.e., Earlier Friday start times/More Saturday morning services). Hopefully, if approved, these modifications may allow more of you to find that iota — and certainly we can all agree that ".002 percent" can be described as an "iota" — of flexibility in your schedules. In preserving our building, I have appealed to your wallets. In preserving our faith, however, I ask for something more personal and more valuable — your time.

In both cases, I believe, the return on investment will exceed your expectations.

As I conclude my first year as your president, I want to say how much I appreciate the ongoing efforts of our staff (teachers, aides, religious director, associate religious director), board members, committee volunteers and congregants. The foundation of our broader B'nai Israel family is built on each of your individual efforts.

I've learned that there's no training manual for this job. The only way you learn it is to do it. And, in that sense, I've been blessed to work alongside marvelous mentors, cordial colleagues and some newfound friends.

9. Actually, no matter who sponsors the oneg, it feels good to hear old familiar voices and know I'm part of this very special group of friends and family. We've been together through thick and thin, good times, bad times, disagreements, agreements, birth, death, wins, losses, struggles, blessings and we are truly together.
8. Even if I don't prepare by reading the Torah portion for the week, I know that Gary will present it so I can follow it and I might even remember the story of the portion.
7. My life is finite. HaShem rested on the Seventh Day and I too need to rest. Friday night TV with greed, mayhem, depressing news, no observance of the Commandments, does not fit the requirement to rest and celebrate.
6. I have an obligation to help make a minyan for those who are there for a personal kaddish. And it just plain feels good to greet and shake hands with fellow Jews on Shabbat.
5. I remember who I am when I hear Torah portions that remind me of the Jewish calendar. This allows me to separate my assimilation from my Jewishness. It helps me make moral decisions and keeps me on the path of Tikun Olam.
4. Now that it's light out later, I can saunter around the synagogue and look at the garden. I will stop at a tree – in May it will be the “Butterflies” magnolia in front of the building. I'll look up, allow myself to revel in child-like wonder at those blossoms that come out before the leaves, and I'll gaze at one flower, mesmerized by the beauty HaShem put in one fragile, delicate yellow bloom.
3. With every passing year, the music becomes more dear to me – Meshebarich, O Seh Shalom, Mi Cha Mocha.
2. It's good for my heart and blood pressure to come to shul, calm myself, look at the nearby windows and Yahrzeit lights, smell the building, release the past week, begin the Sabbath.
1. And once I get there, sit down, hold our familiar prayer book, take a deep breath, and close my eyes, I understand why I should be there on Friday.

We are adding a lift to enable those who can not use the stairs access to all the levels inside the temple. 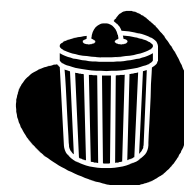
More details will follow soon, so please look for notes and announcements at the Congregation meeting on 5/3 and at Religious School in May.

Many congratulations to Whitney Schreiber and to Lorrene for organizing their trip and supporting the team!!



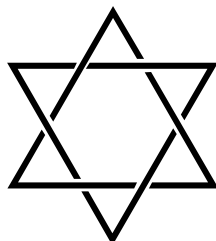
